
## Will Primary Care Practices SURVIVE COVID-19?

Physicians are Experiencing a Loss of Patients and Revenue



The number of physicians in the United States who own a practice has been declining since the late 1980s. In 2020, the MAJORITY of practices are not physician-led.

47.4% of physicians were employed

The COVID-19 GLOBAL PANDEMIC brought a dramatic new financial threat to physician-owned businesses:

- An almost overnight end to routine office visits
- An abrupt drop in elective procedures
- New costs such as technology to support telehealth needs and personal protective equipment



18% Decline in Health spending

## Fewer than 50% of primary care practices had

enough patient volume and cash to stay open for the next four weeks as of May 8, according to American Medical Association experts.



Since the start of the COVID-19 CRISIS in the United States:
